Congratulations on finishing a great term of learning. It is hard to believe it is our first full term onsite since Term 4, 2019 in a pre-pandemic world, where we had no idea of what lay ahead. But here we are now finishing a full term of engaging lessons, explicit teaching, incursions, student led learning (Discovery and Genius hour) and re-establishing friendships. We are so proud of how the students have returned to onsite school life; they have shown resilience, cooperation and courage. We look forward to hopefully welcoming families back inside the classrooms and assemblies next term.

This Friday at assembly, we farewell our LOTE (Italian) Teacher, Signora Donna Salera. Donna has worked at St Mark's for the past 16 years but has decided it is time to spend more time with her growing family and enjoy being a grandmother. We thank Donna for her dedication, passion and wonderful contribution to the St Mark's community. I have no doubt everyone will agree that our Italian program has been educational, fun and engaging for the children due to Donna's passion and commitment. To help celebrate Donna's contribution to St. Mark's the children are asked to wear Italian clours on Friday. We wish Donna all the best with the next phase in her life.

Change over from Summer to Winter Uniform – As our School Photos are being held on Thursday May 5th (Week 2 of Term 2), all students need to be wearing Winter Uniform by the week beginning Monday 2 May. This will allow a one week transition period at the beginning of Term 2.

ANZAC Dawn Service at Fawkner RSL –

Once again this year we have been invited to participate in the ANZAC Day Dawn Service at Fawkner RSL on Monday April 25th at 6.00am (arrive 5.45am). Our Students will be singing the National Anthem. A note has gone home to all families. Thank you to Lara Beltrame for preparing the Choir, they sound beautiful. I encourage all families to come along to support this significant National event where we give thanks to those who have done so much to allow us to live in peace in our wonderful country. Breakfast will be served after the service. Children eat free and adults pay a gold coin donation.

We will also be hosting our own ANZAC Day Service on Tuesday April 26th at 2.30pm in the playground.

Rapid Antigen Testing – The fifth box of rapid antigen tests will be distributed to families this week. These are to be kept for the first two weeks of Term 2.

The testing settings will remain the same, with all primary and secondary school students and staff, early childhood education and care staff, and children aged 3–5 recommended to test at home twice a week, while students and staff at specialist schools are recommended to test five days a week. Families are requested to administer the tests on Mondays and Thursdays each week. Suggested dates are listed below.

RATs have proved an important COVID Safe tool to help reduce the number of COVID-19 cases and ensure our schools are as safe as possible. Their use will remain voluntary for staff and students, but is strongly encouraged.

Families are strongly encouraged to administer the Rapid Antigen Test before school on the following days:

- Tuesday 26th April
- Thursday 28th April
- Monday 2nd May
- Thursday 5th May

Enhancing Catholic School Identity (ECSI) Surveys – All families are invited to participate in the ECSI survey which will assist us in better understanding how our Catholic Identity is expressed in work and practice here at St Mark's Catholic Parish Primary School, Fawkner.

The Catholic University in Leuven, was commissioned by the Catholic Education Commission of Victoria Ltd (CECV) to design a process and tools, based on sound research, to accomplish the goal of understanding our current Catholic identity and where the school community might like to see it in the future.

This survey is a key element in this process and I request the participation of all families. Parents will be asked to complete the survey online; it may take you up to an hour to do so. 5/6 Students and all Staff will also complete the survey. Thank you for your consideration of this request and for your anticipated participation. Please contact the school if you require assistance with accessing the survey.

NAPLAN – information for parents and carers



2022

Why do students do NAPLAN?

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit in May each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students do.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It doesn't replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Schools are transitioning from paper-based to computer-based assessments. Most schools will complete NAPLAN tests online in 2022. All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

Online NAPLAN tests provide more precise results and are more engaging for students. One of the main benefits is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test presents questions which may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. Questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for everyone. ACARA supports inclusive testing so all students can participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, or our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experience of using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.





What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN.

You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

Some familiarisation and explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN online test window is nine days. This is to accommodate schools that may have fewer devices.

The NAPLAN online test window starts on Tuesday 10 May and finishes on Friday 20 May 2022. Tests must be scheduled as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

Online NAPLAN test scheduling requirements are detailed in the table below.

How is my child's performance reported?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at myschool.edu.au

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Palm Sunday (10th April)

This Sunday we celebrate Palm Sunday, which marks the beginning of Holy Week. In this Sunday's Gospel Reading, we read about the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ.



Gospel Reading: <u>The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John</u>
(Taken from Celebrating with Children)

Then Pilate handed Jesus over to them to be crucified. So they took charge of Jesus. He went out, carrying his cross, and came to "The Place of the Skull", as it is called. (In Hebrew it is called "Golgotha"). There they crucified him; and they also crucified two other men, one on each side, with Jesus between them. Pilate wrote a notice and had it on the cross. "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews," is what he wrote. Many people read it, because the place where Jesus was crucified was not far from the city. The notice was written in Hebrew, Latin and Greek. The chief priests said to Pilate, "Do not write, The King of the Jews, but rather, this man said, "I am the King of the Jews."

Pilate answered, "What I have written stays written."

After the soldiers had crucified Jesus they took his clothes and divided them into four parts, one part for each soldier. They also took the robe which was made of one piece of woven cloth without any seams in it. The soldiers said to one another, "Let's not tear it; let's throw dice to see who will get it." This happened in order to make the scripture come true.

"They divided my clothes among themselves and gambled for my robe."

And this is what the soldiers did.

Standing close to Jesus' cross were his mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. Jesus saw his mother and the disciple he loved standing there; so he said to his mother, "He is your son."

Then he said to the disciple, "She is your mother." From that time the disciple took her to live in his home.

Jesus knew that everything had been completed; and in order to make the scripture come true, he said, "I am thirsty."

A bowl was there, full of cheap wine; so a sponge was soaked in the wine, put on a stalk of hyssop, and lifted up to his lips. Jesus drank the wine and said, "It is finished!"

Then he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.

Year 5/6 Learning Update


Hi everyone, LA7 and LA8 have been busy and learning lots of important information and new skills over the last week.


